The questions we will address include the following: what is the meaning of equality and of individual rights? What, if anything, do we owe our fellow citizens? What is the relationship between economic productivity and justice?

**Requirements**

Students are expected to come to class prepared to discuss the readings and should bring the assigned reading to class with them. Class will be mostly run through discussion, though I will occasionally lecture. There will be one quiz, two exams and one paper assignment. The quiz is worth 5%, the first exam is worth 15% of the grade; the final exam is worth 25%; the papers are worth 45% of the grade (broken down into several parts); participation is worth the remaining 10%.

There are several parts to the paper assignment. You will have to write two short summary papers (about one page), describing the arguments in two articles.
